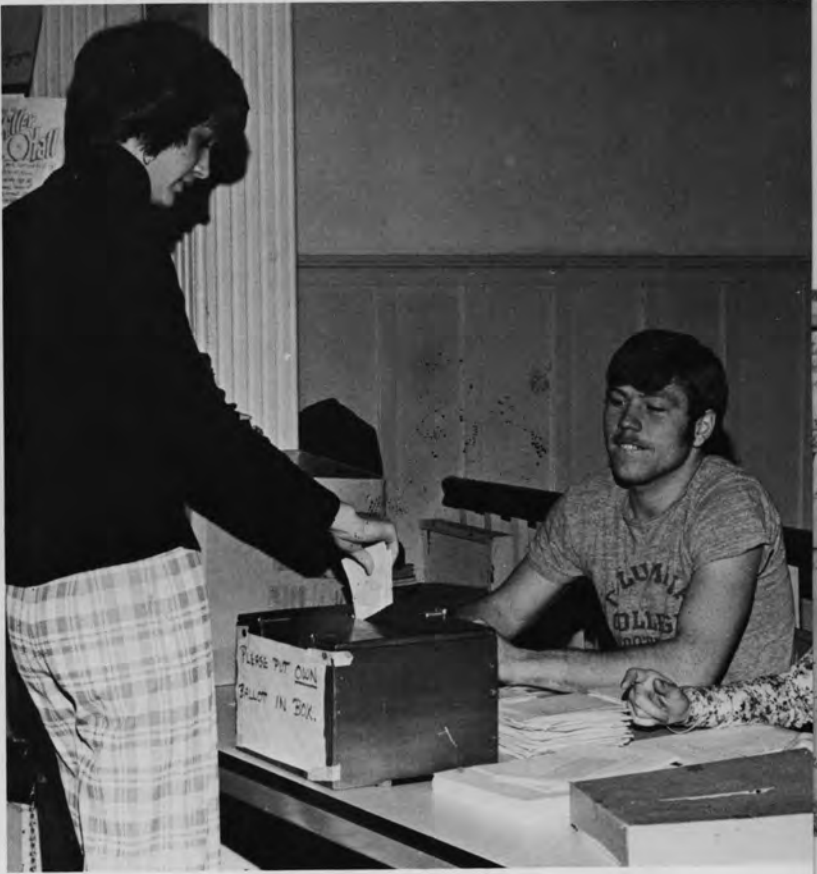

For the first time in its many years of existence, the Double Sextette is now the Double Sextet. 1974-1975 marked the end of a long Columbia College tradition by admitting six men into the group. Again, the Double Sextet provided a flashy song-and-dance stage show with a repertoire ranging from standards such as "And I Love You So" to popular tunes like "Tie A Yellow Ribbon 'Round The Ole Oak Tree" and "Say, Has Anybody Seen My Sweet Gypsy Rose?" This year the Double Sextet toured several midwestern cities along with its performances at several school functions throughout the year, including outstanding performances at College Weekends and an especially enjoyable year-end concert.

Forward Motion is the performance outlet for Columbia College's dance students. Dancers have a chance to both perform and choreograph dances. Like the Double Sextet, Forward Motion performed at many CC functions. Their dance material ranged from different musical eras, but their most memorable performance contained material from the movie hit "That's Entertainment!" People could see the hits of yesteryear performed in a new, creative way. Forward Motion's faculty advisor is Suellen Wells, whose enthusiasm and creativity carried over to

her outstanding dancers.

Camerata Choir is Columbia College's most prestigious vocal ensemble. Its members are the very best singers at CC who auditioned for director Mrs. Elaine Grev at the beginning of the year. Its performances are consistently the epitome of precise musical interpretation. 1974-1975 was another brilliant year for this ensemble, with outstanding performances at its Spring Concert and Winter Concert. The Winter Concert provided excellent renditions of traditional classic and folk carols, and the Spring Concert offered a variety of songs on different themes from hymns to ballads.

Concert Choir is open to all, but this year to no sacrifice of quality. Concert Choir provides CC students a chance to sing, but also gives choral conducting students at CC a chance to gain valuable experience conducting this large and talented group. Under the direction of these students, or under the direction of faculty director Tom Mills, the group was again an outstanding organization. It performed at the Spring Concert and Winter Concert with the Camerata Choir, providing the top musical events of the year at CC.

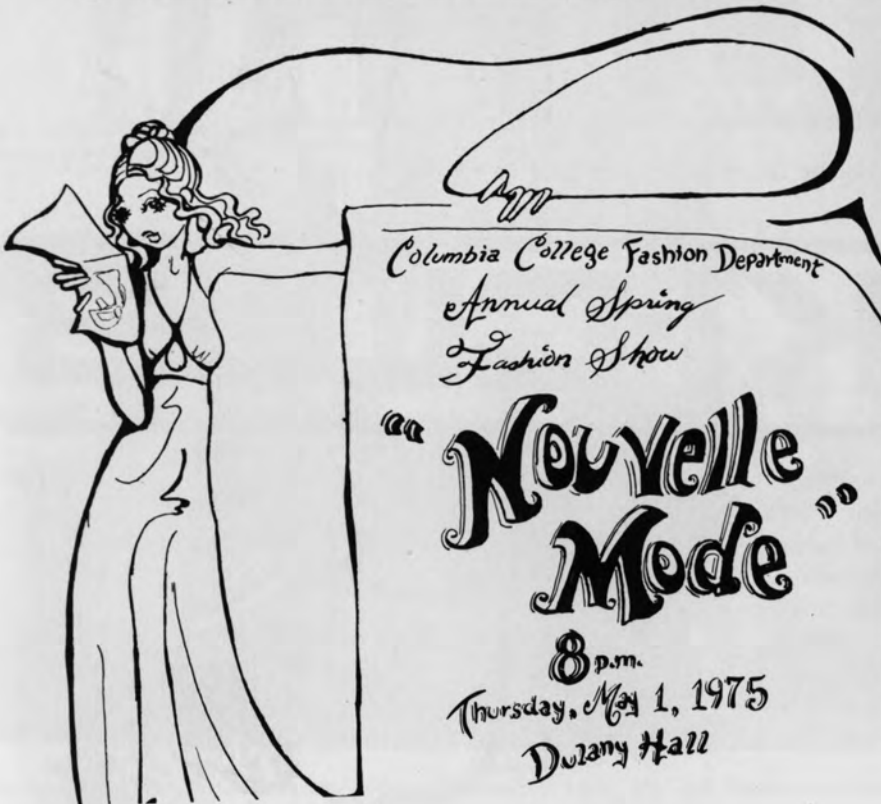

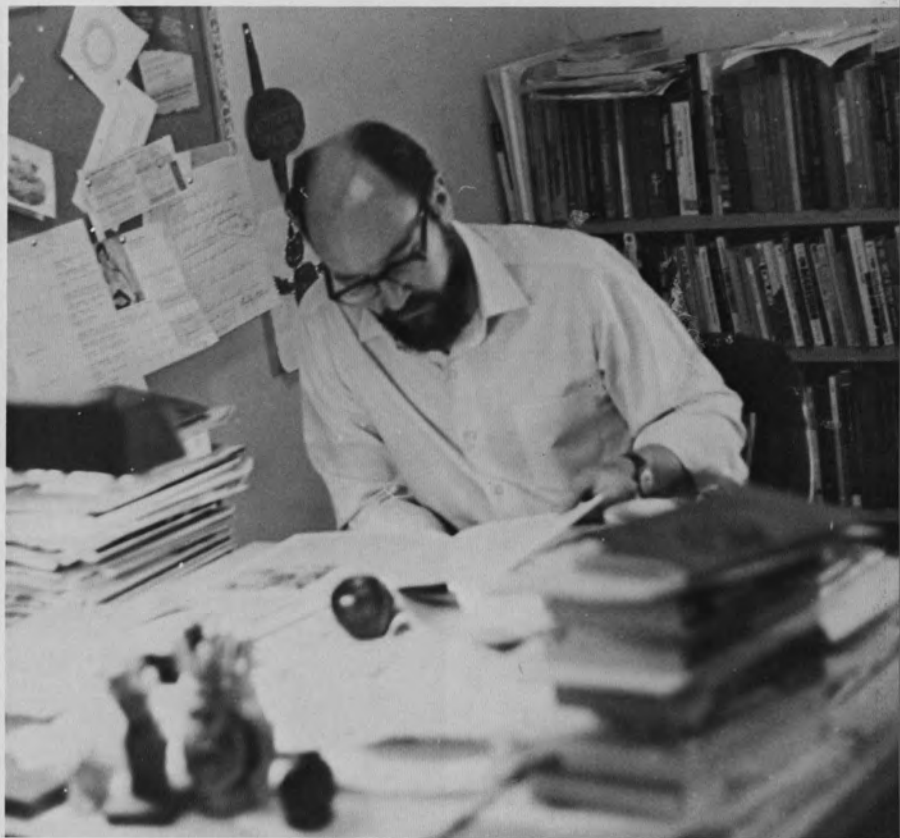


SOCIAL SCIENCES

A loose-knit Sociology department allowed students to observe social structures and relationships at their own pace, with the exception of Mr. Craighead's "happenings" every Thursday morning.



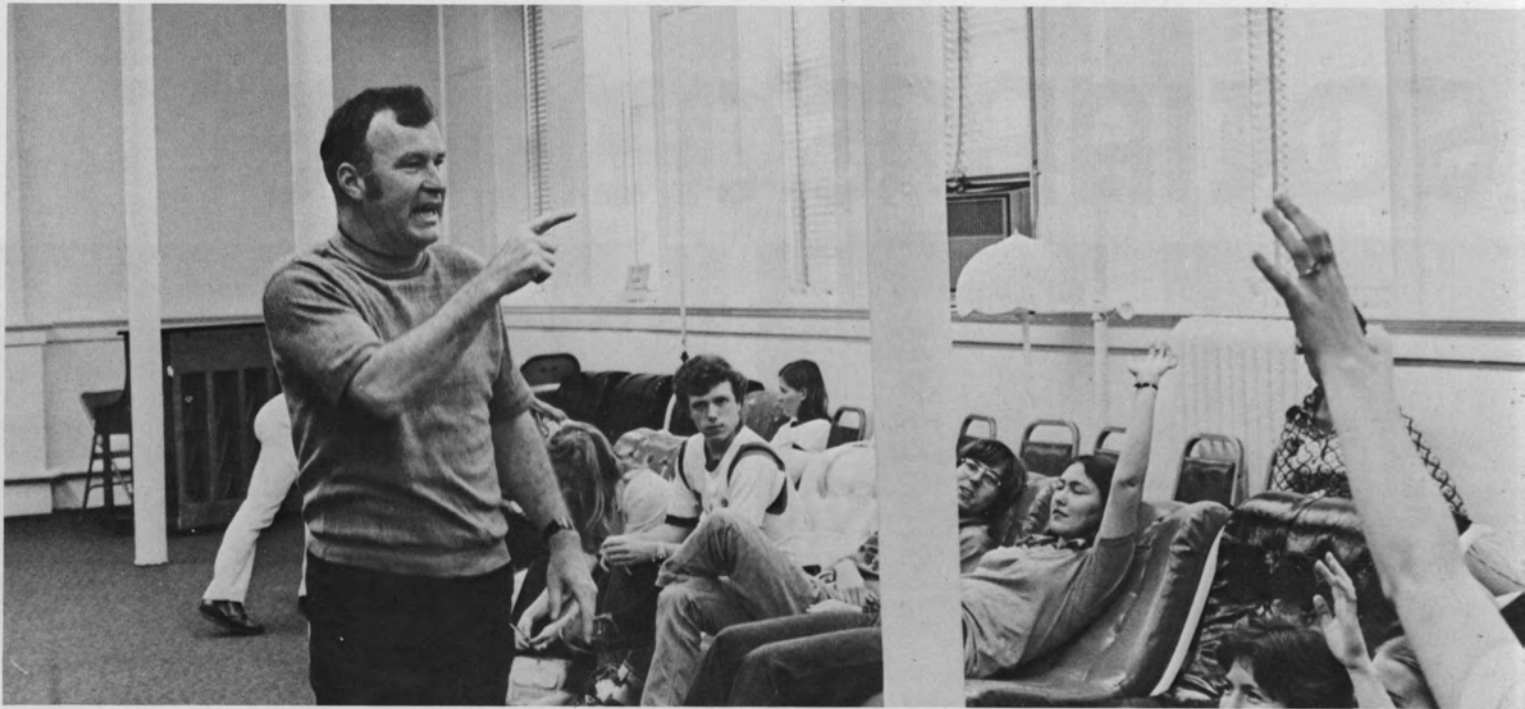
