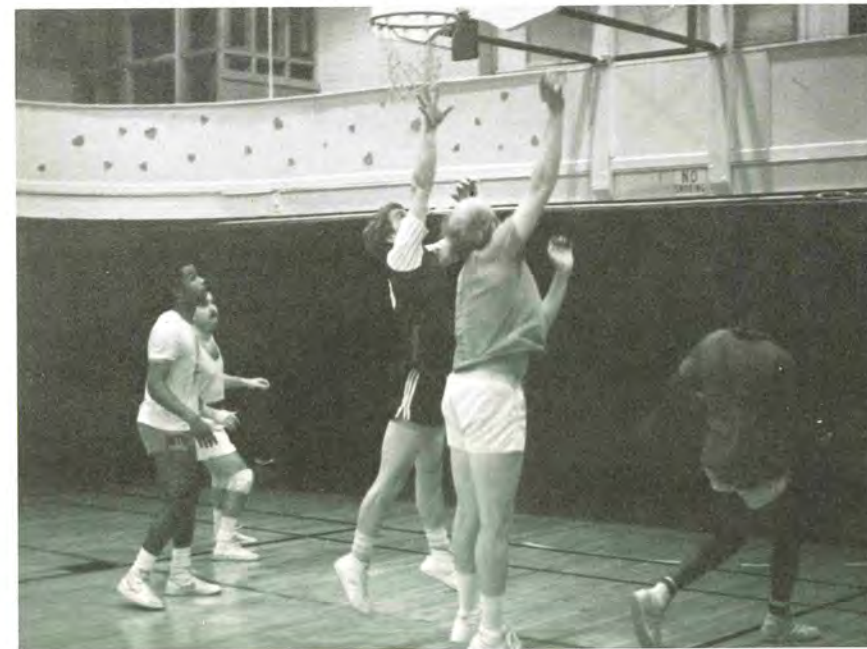

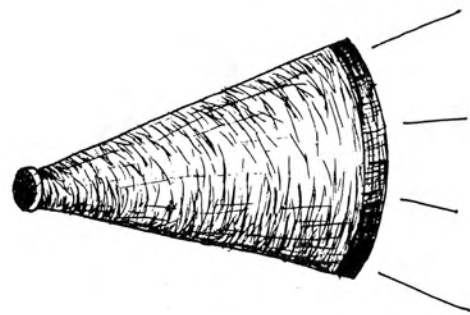

The club was sponsored by Denise Snyder Shockley.

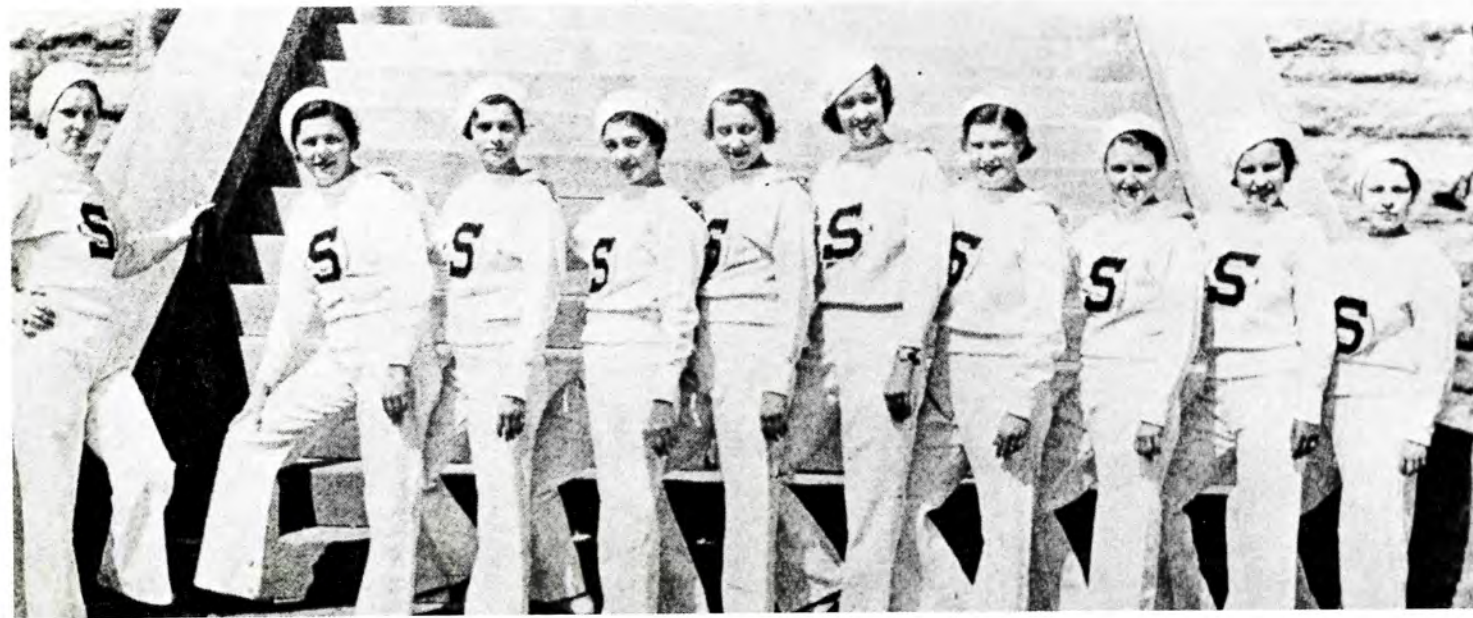

MUSIC

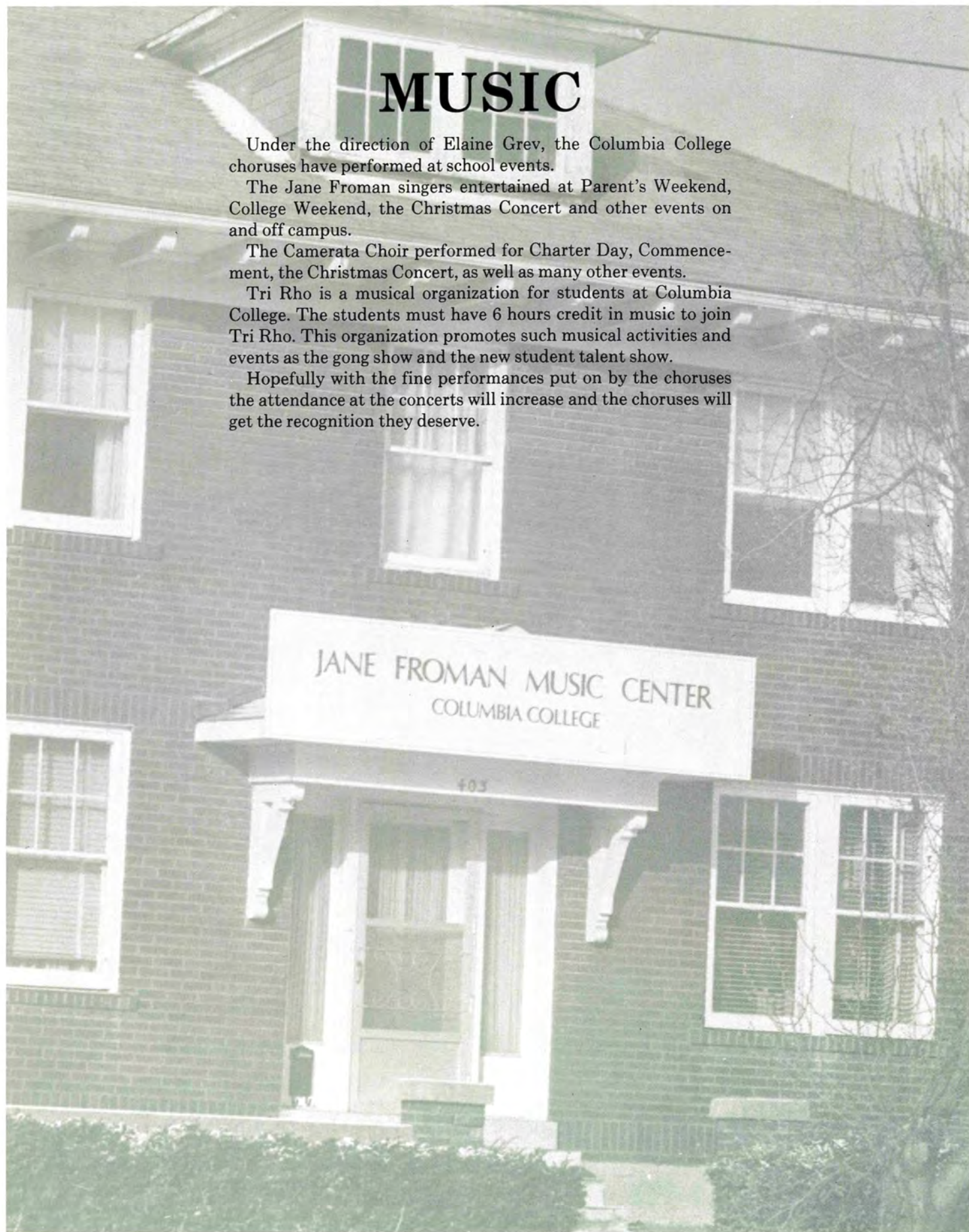
Under the direction of Elaine Grev, the Columbia College choruses have performed at school events.

I suspect that good teaching has the same magical quality. Inside every good writer and teacher must linger the demon of Socrates." Dr. Anthony Alioto.

Staff Dedicates This Book and **ATHLETICS**

Since Art Seibels came to Columbia College in 1977, there have been many changes. In 1977 Coach Siebels was a part-time employee as head coach of basketball at C.C. at the same time he taught part-time in Hallsville, Mo.

Siebels background: graduated from S.E. Missouri State, became a graduate assistant at the University of Arizona in 1966, was Director of recreations at a rehabilitation center, was Athletic Director and Coach at Missouri Baptist College in St. Louis, Mo.

By January of 1977 he became a full-time employee and began coaching baseball and golf as well as basketball. There were eight sports at C.C. then. In the spring of 1979, the sports were dropped due to financial problems. They decided to bring back basketball, baseball, softball, and volleyball. In the 1979-80 school year, Siebels was made Director of Athletics as well as the basketball and baseball coach. Since then, baseball has been dropped and C.C. has added cross country.

From 1977-1979, C.C. went from having a contending, well-known sports department to having almost none. Now they are building again. They have four sports which are looking very promising. The volleyball team won 11 games and had no seniors. The basketball team won their opening game, a first for a long time, and they finished with a 6-17 record. They have but one senior on the team. With these young teams we can expect a promising future.


